The kakapo (*Strigops habroptilus*) is a large, flightless, nocturnal parrot, endemic to New Zealand. It is critically endangered, with a world population of ca. 62 individuals and a male-biased adult sex ratio. The species has a polygynous “lek” mating system and adult males typically weigh 30–40% more than females.

The kakapo was widespread in beech and podocarp (a dwarf conifer) forests of southern New Zealand, but Maoris and, later; European settlers, cleared 75% of this native vegetation. Settlers also introduced “alien” predators, including cats, stoats, weasels and dogs. Grazing animals, such as sheep, also drastically altered.
